Subjective Maps / Disappearances is an atlas: a collection of maps made by artists who work in certain specific territorics of Europe, small states and geopolitical micro-areas that belong to the Little Constellation network.

But mapmaking is a form of storytelling, so these maps are presented in the guise of that cultural archetype for the transmission and preservation of knowledge: the book, found for this exhibition in a range of possible reformulations such as fanzine, object, and artist's book. Disappearance is a term that spontaneously emerged during a discussion with Halldór Björn Runólfsson, Director of the National Gallery of Iceland, which is housing the show connected to this publication, during a workshop held in Revkjavik in November 2011. The focus on this word generated a series of insights, some linked to the narrative tradition of Iceland. Indeed, one cannot help but note the importance in Icelandic folklore and mythology of that vast Book of Imaginary Beings so that fascinated Jorge Luis Borges, teeming with elves and trolls, creatures that are invisible-or visible, insofar as their presence is intensely felt-real or imaginary, lurking within or springing from the unconscious. Each of these presences is capable of conveying the deep human need for a multiplicity of archetypal visions. and the broader need to conceive and tell stories that can take on new forms in the present. Now more than ever, these insights

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and sensations are facets of a compelling necessity to preserve every form of imagination, as a way of countering the very concept of *disappearance*.

Building on these ideas, certain aspects were singled out as starting points for this study of "disappearance". The first has to do with the metaphoric connotation of the idea as it relates to a sociopolitical and economic condition. Nowadays, must a small community, embedded in a context of international institutions, fear erasure?

For an individual who is part of a social system, what it mean to disappear? These questions served as points of departure for a stage of discussion and dialogue that this book documents through the contributions of each artist.

And the artists, with their various *subjective maps*, usher us into an individual, mirror-like *atlas of the emotions*, experienced within the specific geopolitical and geocultural contexts we address, or like fanciful adventure stories, take us in search of mysterious, faraway worlds yet to be explored.
