JUROR"S STATEMENT

I would like to thank Brad Place and the Faculty of the Tulsa University Art Department for inviting me to judge this exhibit. Also, I'd like to pay my respects to Herb Gussman. It is pleasant to reflect that his generosity has enriched most of Tulsa's cultural activities, including this encouragement for young artists.

I'm often asked, "What do you lock for when you judge an exhibit?" Before any submitted work is eliminated, The looked at all works many times, giving each time to "speak". I look hard at each work asking myself two questions, "What was the artist trying to convey?", then, "does the work say what the artist intended?" Another question implied, if not asked, is how can I presume to be a judge? A mechanic who has listened to 10,000 motors can tell you why your motor is off its timing or if it sounds right. By the same reasoning, every artistic image I've seen for several decades comes to my aid in making a decision about an art work.

This exhibit is a fine compliment to an excellent faculty and good students. I saw evidence of solid training, good craftsmanship, and was especially pleased to see few dependencies of established national trends. These students are not beholden to Europe, New York or the West Coast - instead their work reflects a healthy individualism. Perhaps the Oklahoman's relative closeness to pioneer days is partly responsible for this indepeence - at any rate, the resultant originality is good to behold.

So - congratulations to all concerned. The only thing I don't enjoy about the judging process is that someone gets left out and I feel sorry about that. I hope that people in Tulsa come to see this fine exhibit. Give each work a fair chance to relay its message to you and you'll share my enthusiasm and optimism.
